Local Rights of Way work continues and the arrival of the full set of 6" to the mile definitive maps on loan from the South Yorkshire C.C. will certainly assist us. Our Huddersfield based member, John Lee, has been working hard to ensure that his area is being well covered in the current West Yorkshire review.

Plenty of requests for places on the pre-AGM run are being received - will anyone who intends to ride and has not already informed me please let me know as soon as possible; it is important.

After representations from us, the Leicestershire C.C. has withdrawn its proposed S.108 application to downgrade Allexton Lane near Market Harboro'. We presented them with substantial 'evidence of use' and said we would assist in its waymaking, if necessary. Thanks go to all those who completed use forms and especially the riders who said they were prepared to appear in court as witnesses.

The Leics CC has at long last started its review of RUPP's. Being one of the more enlightened authorities, they are consulting all interested bodies as per Circular 44/68, before they publish the Draft Map. They have supplied us with a complete set of Definitive 6" to the mile maps and their initial proposals for our comments.

They are proposing some 50 Byways out of about 180 RUPP's, which goes along pretty well with our wishes, bearing in mind most Leicestershire lanes are Unclassified County Roads. The only problem area appears to be Rutland where they want to downgrade all 14 RUPP's to Bridloway. Any assistance in this area would be most welcome.

The NCB has now applied for planning permission for the new coalfield in the Vale of Belvoir. The three planned mines only affect one green lane which runs from Saxlebye to Welby; we have asked for a suitable diversion so that we can continue to use it.

David Martin has organised a Dinner/Dance at the Yew Lodge, Kegworth, on November 24th. The cost is approx. £4.50. per head, so if you are interested in giving your wife/girlfriend a whirl, give Dave a ring on Derby 792781.

BRIAN THOMPSON'S R.O.W. BIT

Somerset. Hopes of a change of mind from Taunton officials following a visit by member Nike Keevil. After studying Counsel's Legal Opinion which says that Special Reviews have no power to extinguish vehicular rights, Mr. Dixon (County RoW Officer) admits they were unwise to think that they had closed all lanes. Mr. Dixon put it to Mike Keevil (and also to Alistair Flew when he visited a Wiltshire enquiry to see how we handled curselves - as Alistair is one of our best experts he will have gone back to Somerset with a worried look) that as they now accept that bridleways with vehicular rights can only be closed in court, we should be satisfied with this. My reaction is No thank you, we want Byways.

Mike Rowley argues that BR status would keep out the trouble-makers. Fred Furlong has sent in 300 TRF objections. That means many Public Enquiries. However, the situation is looking a lot more cheerful, and the County may concede an early defeat.

Leicestershire: Covered in East Midlands Group report.

Clwyd, North Wales: Following the appeal, Jeff Allen, 22
Beech Court, Allerton Road, Liverpool 18, has volunteered
to help and will represent the TRF for Clwyd and visit Mold
to look at maps and see officials. Albert Harper, 86 Hafod
Park, Mold, is also helping. Don't leave all the work to
these two!

Gloucestershire: A well used green lane at Shurdington (Green Way Hill) was closed at Cheltenham Court on 21st September. Despite a whole day spent in Court by TRF and ACU/BMF members, the JP's decided the lane was not needed and handed it over to the local farmer to plough up! Dave Rolfe represented the TRF in court and is willing to form a new TRF Group based in Cheltenham and using Glos. lanes. He lives at 139 Carter Road, Cheltenham, Glos. Tel: 38675.

Devon & Wiltshire: Results of Public Enquiries in Devon and Wiltshire held in 1977 make grim reading. All the Devon lanes were lost, about 30 in all, mainly because our man offered no evidence and said nothing. More were lost in Wiltshire, again mainly because of our apathy.

Northumberland: Miss Anne Pickering is alive and well and living as a Town Councillor at 'Darlington', Oakwood, Hexham. The County Special Review is under way and help is invited to survey this big, wide and handsome country. Anne is 'our gal' for the TRF here.

Scotland: I can supply maps of old drove roads with photos from Dr. Haldones book 'Drove Roads of Scotland'. The RoW situation is as England and Wales pre-1835, i.e. dodgey. All rely on Common Law. However, the law of trespass is weak. Some drove roads have full rights. Hugh Davidson is the man to contact up there. Expect no help from the TRF if you get into trouble with the law in Scotland. No County Road or definitive maps there.

Derbyshire: As predicted, the repairs to the bridge over the River Rymass on RUPP No. 6 in the Parish of Hassop brought forth a mild reprimand from the County. We are asked to obtain permission first in future. They say that the uneven surface on the bridge may result in horse rider complaints, although they add that this is not a criticism of the work done by the TRF. Other Groups note. Best to give them 14 days notice to object, then if not received get stuck in. In Derbyshire we all remember that it took a whole year to repair one gate.

Yorkshire Dales: The Dales National Park says that they are grateful for the responsible attitude that the TRF takes against riders who break the law, and asks for our help to reduce the nuisance of youngsters scrambling over open moorland. They request the aid of the Press in this. If you see anyone, report them.

Cheshire: Macclesfield Borough Council and the Peak Park are planning a fancy country park and intend the several green lanes in the area for bridleway use only. Charity Lane is without any protection in law and I have asked the Cheshire Group to claim it as a Byway to protect our interests. Keep using.

National Parks Rep: Success! Trevor Wade, c/o Dockland Settlements, City Road, Bristol, has offered to take on this job. To be confirmed at the AGM.

Mislcading signs (Part 2): Lots of time is wasted in trying to get footpath and bridleway signs removed from RUPP's and County Roads. Whole counties like Notts and South Yorks erect footpath signs on everything. Very few authorities will put up the correct sign which, for County Roads, is 'Unsuitable for Motors'. As long as County Hall admit the proper status, I suggest you leave it alone, although this will not prevent ramblers accusing us of being on the wrong track. Remember, though, to prevent at all costs such signs as Private Road, No Vehicles, No Motorcycles, No Right of Way, etc.

Training Weckend: I plan a weekend training course (with some riding to loosen the blood) next September in Derbys.. if the TRF will sponsor and keep the cost of food and board down to £5. per head. Anyone interested? We ertainly need more Row workers.

RoW matters are a lot better than ever before and expenditure on RoW in 1978 will total £1,000., shared equally by the TRF and ACU/BMF. If we lose the Marsh Lane case in the House of Lords, it will be £2,000. As £2. out of your £3. annual sub is spent on the Bulletin, you will see how tight things would be without ACU/BMF support. The TRF would be bankrupted by one case taken to a higher court. and that is a weakness that could be exploited by our friends in the RA. (In fact, costs of the Bulletin this year work out to less than £1. out of each annual sub - Ed.) Blackmail works though, as we found in North Yorkshire, and Curther threats are rumoured in Derbyshire when the battles start.

Seriously though, although there have been, and are, one or two problems, I have enjoyed (masochist) the job and feel now that the gestation period is over (nine months vou see! No? - Oh well!) I have some idea what the job. and more important what the TRF, is all about. However, this article is - at least that's the intention - to put you in the picture as to my thoughts and also hopefully to elicit some response from you - the reader. So here goes!

It was my aim, whilst in Office, to see the TRF grow in strength, both in the number of members and in respectability and recognition through the Fellowship's authoritative approach to Rights of Way. Both of these I have seen attained, although our credibility has suffered on a couple of occasions. Happily, suitable action by your Committee has made good the damage.

The membership now stands at some 600, whereas during the latter part of 1977 it stood in the mid-400's. However, the Fellowship has in past years experienced a fluctuating membership and I feel, as do many Group Reps, that now is the time to consolidate our position. To do this we must find an answer to the question - why do individuals not renew their membership? Perhaps the TRF should be doing more for its members in return for their £3. annual subs? Don't forget though that each member receives the right to be legally defended in any reasonable legal RoW entanglement occasioned by trail riding and that your rights are ably cared for both by the Officers of your own local TRF Group and by 'Superpump, keep it quiet and under 20 mph' Thompson, the TRF's Rights of Way Officer. We are the only motorcycle club that can provide full information on where it is legal to ride anywhere in the UK.

My own thoughts are along the lines that the TRF must support and assist the local Groups more positively and provide, with money from our central funds, publicity material, printed advice on Rights of Way, etc. The Groups themselves must also do more, particularly from the social angle, and this may be done by running barbecues, treasure hunts and sponsored runs, i.e. the recent MAG run when toys were collected for hospitals. (Good public relations this.)

Now to conclude! I would like through this article to thank my fellow Committee members for all their assistance in my 'birth'. They all in their various positions (touch of the Kama Sutra here) do an excellent job and it is hoped that during the coming months we shall have the assistance of a TRF National Parks Officer. Sadly, this will not be Margery Price, but another body has volunteered (I thought it was said 'never volunteer' - obviously our new recruit has never been in the Forces) and I hope we will render him our fullest support. (What's that from the back - one body-belt and a push out of the mud!)

Cheers for now. Keep mudplugging and see you at the AGM. P.S. Don't forget to write.

XT 500 INFORMATION APPEAL

In the July/August issue of this magazine a letter of mine was published, requesting XT 500 information in order, hopefully, to form the basis of a Reader's Enquiry Service. The result was as follows:

- i) There are two XT 500 owners in the TRF.
- ii) I am not going to resign because of (i).
- iii) My mum still thinks it's a good idea.

To continue, the 'drop the bike on the right and it won't start' answer seems to be:-

Hold decompressor in, throttle fully open, kick over (not literally) several times, then close throttle, kick over as usual keeping throttle closed.

An alternative to the problem is to fit a 34 mm. Amal carb as mentioned in T & MX News, August 25th, 1978. This mod., according to the aforementioned paper, also improves performance (copies of article available - read on.)

Several other notable points from the survey were:

a) Split pins are desirable for the wheel nuts.

b) Berm specialities as mentioned in Bike magazine for XT 500 goodies are no more.

c) A chain tensioner is available from Malcolm Smith.

d) Regina Extra chain (£14.) is recommended.

e) Preston Petty can supply both front and rear mudguards.

I do have lots more info from T & MX News, MCN, the gospel magazine Bike and some American mags, plus the two letters received. If anyone would like any specific info, send me a large SAE and I will do my best to obtain the answers. Before we leave XT 500's, a fully enclosed chainguard or a chain oiler manufacturer/supplier would be greatly appreciated. Anyone knowing of such an animal, please drop me a line.

Finally, the Reader's Enquiry Service - if anyone would like to write to me about any motorcycle model (careful) or general stuff like sprockets, chains, etc., I'll add this to my stock of info, edit and send bits for publication. Also, of course, if you've changed bikes (or the bike has changed you) and you want info, write to your friendly Reader's Enquiry Service (SAE again, please), and I will do my best.
